
Results Highlights



Spending Patterns

- Most funds went towards food (30.6%) and rent (29.9%)
- Only 2% of funds were used towards the alcohol, cigarettes, or drug category (no increase from baseline)
- The next largest category was "other"
 (11.8%). Recipients spent money on things
 that we did not predict and were very
 specific to that individuals' needs including donating


For youth who age out of foster care, 36% will experience homelessness by the age of 26 years old.

For Black youth, this figure is 60%.




50% of unhoused adults first experienced youth homelessness.


For the chronically homeless, this % is even higher.




"45% of adults experiencing homelessness have at least one job, and another 40% cannot work as a result of disability
